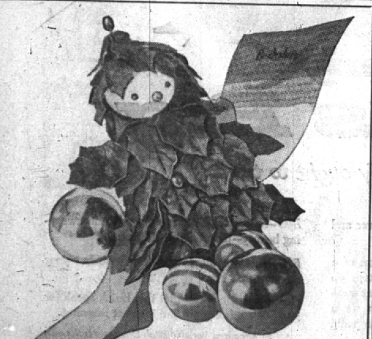

To leave on her wedding trip, the bride changed into a blue and white raw silk tweed, with which



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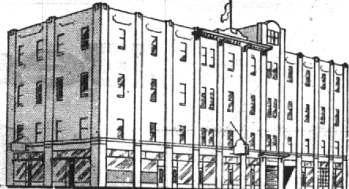
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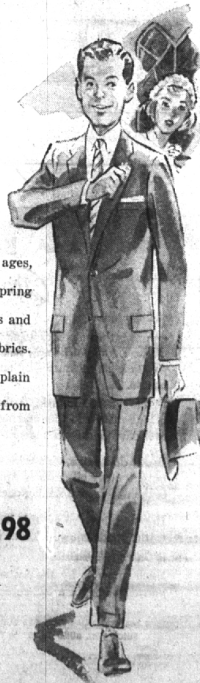
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
