

Lathrup Village Birthday Gift Purchased At Venetian Glass Factory

LATHRUP — On their European travels Mr. and Mrs. Homer S. Harrison, Bloomfield, returned to Birmingham on Jan. 24, Mrs. Harrison's birthday. She chose to celebrate her day by taking a trip to Venice and seeing a Venetian glass factory.

Arriving in the city of the canals they went by motorized launch to the island of Murano where Venetian glass is made. They purchased 19 pieces of the hand-made glass and watched the master craftsman perfect each piece. A special birthday gift was a glass horse.

MR. HARRISON, engineer with Allied Steel, designed special machinery which was bought by Renault of Paris, Volkswagen of Hanover and Opel of Frankfurt and which required his supervision for its installation. So to the Harrisons went the opportunity to combine business with pleasure on a 5-week tour of Europe.

They spent two weeks in Paris where, with business excursions, he visited his friends, shopped and spent her time sight-seeing.

SEVERAL DAYS were spent at the Negresco in Nice, the Florida of Europe, with their hotel suite overlooking the Mediterranean and a door to the balcony always open. Flowers presented an array of beautiful color and the view of the mountains was magnificent. They went to Monaco where they visited Monte Carlo and the palace of Prince Rainier.

The Harrisons had a short stay in Rome but an interesting one. Mrs. Harrison said. Having met Michel Fontana when she spoke at Detroit's Town Hall last October, Mrs. Harrison was especially interested in seeing the Fontana spring fashion show. They arrived the day it was presented and were given entrance by Michel. She is one of three sisters who with their mother form the House of Fontana, listed among the six top European designers today.

THEY SAT at small round tables, about 18 inches wide, covered with pink tablecloths that reached to the floor. The show was held in the great ballroom of Rome's Excelsior with its high ceilings and its fabulous chandeliers. Mrs. Harrison's choice in the costumes shown were the beautifully made suits, some of silk and some made from printed cotton satens.

Then came Milan and Venice with its tour of the glass factory and a birthday dinner at the Danieli. Switzerland was next on their itinerary and here the Harrisons visited at Zurich for a very short time. The other cities of Europe have much that is old mingled with much that is very new, but in Zurich was a place apart. Mrs. Harrison said. Here everything seemed very old and very quaint and very, very clean.

"EVERYWHERE everything is spot and shining," she said. Here the streets are washed. The street cars are a bright blue with sparkling clean windows. And all around are the snow-covered mountains.

Watches bought in Zurich will bring back pleasant memories of this charming place.

Then following visits to Frankfurt and Hanover for business and more sight seeing. On to Amsterdam for two and a half days of things to see.

Next was London and the first TV since they left home. Over there TV is seen only 2 hours daily Mrs. Harrison reported. Children's programs she said are interesting and educational and are not the wild excitable ones we too often see here. More sight seeing and shopping filled their days.

THEN PARIS again for two last days, the Lido, Polin Berge, dancing, dining and enjoying every minute of it.

And finally a week-end in New York with a visit to Radio City Music Hall and a confirmed belief that here the dancers are better.

The Harrisons found this "off season" in Europe with hotel accommodations good. The money difference created the usual problems. In Paris Mrs. Harrison struggled with pencil and paper and the price of things where 350 francs equal \$100, until the engineer in her husband came to the rescue. He simply produced his slide rule and arrived at all the right answers without effort.

Three cameras made the trip with them and were used effectively. The sharing of their pictures with family and friends will bring to the Harrisons many happy memories.
