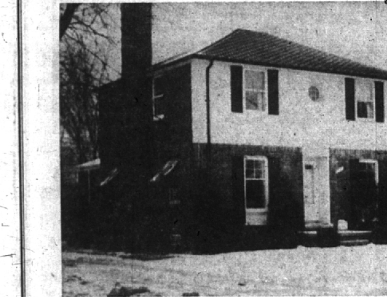

Dutch Elm Program Still Questionable

LATHRUP—Council members are still wondering what to do about a program to combat Dutch elm disease, despite the fact that last week to get public opinion.

Disappointed over the poor turnout there were only about 20 people in attendance—the council in question.

Leonard A. Watchowski, city administrator, said about a dozen letters were on file from residents, most of which supported a city-backed program.

To GAIN more information, council asked Charles D. Kelley, tree committee member, to ask Michigan State University experts to give them advice at the next council meeting.

Councilman Richard N. Cogger gained support from other councilmen in proposing a city-sponsored program which would give residents the benefit of a broad, and thereby less expensive undertaking, and at the same time not cost the city too much.

Pruning, spraying and other methods of combating the disease would run, according to estimates, from \$1.50 to \$3 per tree. With 4,000 trees in Lathrup, the city would have to spend between \$6,000 and \$12,000 to carry on a full-scale battle.

GIRL SCOUT TROOPS

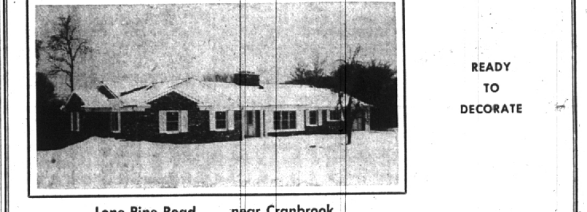

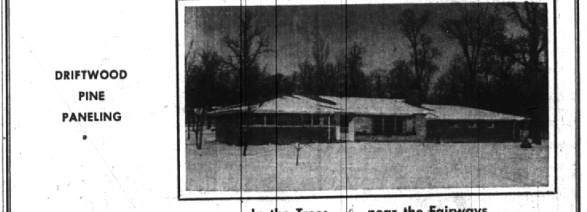
