How many points should a team score against an opponent before the coach sends in substitutes to hold down the score in a one-sided basketball game?

That was coach Bob Watts' problem in the Southfield Van Dyke game Friday night. After the first quarter the Jays took a lopsided lead and Watts began substituting freely with one exception: his all-league candidate, guard Ken Moser.

Moser was the only regular who saw much action in the second half, scoring 32 points for a new Jay scoring record. Otherwise, with exception of the opening minutes of the third and fourth quarters, the substitutes filled the lineup as the Jay squad scored 83 points, another school record.

THE SUBS were as hot as the regulars and there wasn't much chance of holding the score down even with the rookie lineup.

"I've never tried to run up a score in my life," Watts said, "but when a kid plays as hard as Moser all season and then gets a chance to see a new scoring record, how can you pull him out of a game? It just wouldn't be fair."

Everyone agreed with Watts that the talented Moser deserved the right to stay in the lineup and try for the record.

"I wasn't interested in the 83 points," Watts said, "we could have broken the old record of 71 a couple of times in the past but Moser is a senior and deserves a crack at the single-game scoring record."

THE SUBJECT of Moser is one in which Watts excels and his performance of Friday night gave the Jay coach and Bob Hall, Southfield athletic director, new ammunition for carrying the Moser banner.

"Moser is one of the smartest kids I've ever seen on the floor," Hall said, "he is thinking every minute out there."

Both credit Moser in large part for Southfield's comeback this season. The Jays have won eight out of their last nine starts and the last six in a row after dropping their first three games.

MAPLES STILL IN RACE

Moser's 32 Points In One-Sided Win Sets School Record

The "little man" was the big man for Southfield again Friday night as the Jays scored an impressive 83-40 win over Van Dyke to rack up its sixth straight basketball victory.

Ken Moser, Southfield's 6-foot guard who has been an outstanding performer all season, scored 32 points, a new school scoring record, and combined with his teammates for the 83 total points which is another Southfield record. Both records were set with plenty to spare.

Moser's 32 points is six better than the old record of 26 and the 83 point total replaces the former mark of 71 set against Walled Lake two years ago and tied against Waterford last season.

MOSER's record on 12 field goals and 8 free throws. Moser made 15 of 20 field attempts and could have scored more but passed off to his teammates on many opportunities.

Southfield played without the services of Bob Evans, the Jays' other top scorer, who sat out the week's cage action with classroom difficulties. Another regular, Steve Klauik, played with a sprained ankle as a result of an automobile accident earlier in the week.

Both Bob Watts ended the game with the score down but the subs were as hot as the regulars. Bob Watts ended the game with a 10-5 lead but the Bentley broke into the scoring column through a 1-11 tie.

ONLY in the first period were the visitors in the game when they trailed 12-14 at the end of the quarter. Southfield had a comfortable 42-16 lead at the half and

scored at will in the second half for its easiest win of the season.

Besides Moser, only Ray Filar scored double-figures for the Jays, hitting 14 points. The rest of the scoring was divided among eight players.

The victory gives the Jays a 6-1 Inter-Lakes league record and a 8-4 season mark. Van Dyke is still looking for its first win this season.

SOUTHFIELD'S reserves also won, 54-39, with Ed Foster's 14 points leading the way.
