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Lawrence H. Pomeroy Memorial Dedicated

A lasting memorial to the late Lawrence H. Pomeroy was dedicated Sunday by the Rev. Arnold F. Runkel, First Methodist church.

Six stained glass windows, three on either side of the church chancel, were presented to the church in Mr. Pomeroy's memory by 57 of his friends in the church, his family and business associates. Mrs. Lawrence H. Pomeroy, of Colonial court, attended the service. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence H. Pomeroy, Jr., came from Chicago to be present. Another son, John R. Pomeroy, 426 Greenwood, attended with his wife.

MR. POMEROY, whose untimely death occurred in December, 1953, had been Dearborn Motors' assistant general sales manager in charge of staff operations prior to his resignation in March, 1953. He served on the First Methodist church's first building council, in charge of promotion and publicity. He was also a member of the church's official board.

They represent the six worship experiences held within the church chancel and sanctuary: baptism, praise, prayer, preaching, communion and matrimony.

The windows were executed by Willet Stained Glass company, of Philadelphia, Pa.
