Local Radio Ham Relays Death News

Amateur radio operator, Dr. Earl Weston, 5655 Portman, Walnut Lake, played a major role in breaking the news of the death of a Grand Rapids missionary, who died to death after a shark severed his leg in a river near Rives, Nicaragua.

Beaming his radio towards Ecuador for news of another, the missionary who was killed by Andean Indian arrows, T. Edward McCully, Jr., husband of the former Marion Hobbs of Pontiac, Weston picked up a frantic call from a Costa Rica radio ham vainly trying to reach a Grand Rapids station.

Cutting in, Weston learned that Lester Barton, 33, Grand Rapids missionary to Central America, had died "while swimming during an hour's delay at the Nicaraguan border."

THE LOCAL radio operator contacted Burton's brother, Phillip, at work in Grand Rapids and through Weston's station, Phillip Burton learned the gruesome details of his brother's death.

"Phillip was in tears by the time he got the details of the death," said Weston, who added that it was an unfortunate situation for him to have to notify relatives of the death. "On the other hand I was glad to be able to help out."

By a 9 to 1 margin, Birmingham city employees last week voted to have their city retirement program coordinated with social security.

The vote was 96 to 7.

Final step is approval of the charter amendment by voters at the April second election. With the charter amendment's approval, nearly all general city members in the Birmingham retirement system will have social security coverage.

Because federal law prohibits their social security coverage, Birmingham city policemen and firemen are excluded from the plan.
