Contrasting shades of gray in imported wool slacks and an Adrian silk shantung sports shirt with a maroon stripe is an ideal leisure combination chosen by Ed Heins.

For that "continental" look in head wear, William McCravy dons a velours sports hat with a narrow brim, a silk repp tie and a wool tattersall vest. His gray mocha gloves are "hand-in-hand" with an aquascutum of London raincoat.
