\$200,000 Injury Suit Settled for \$15,000

SOUTHFIELD—John Johnson, 55, 29645 Westland, settled a \$200,000 damage suit against the Detroit Street Railway system for \$15,000 last week.

Johnson claimed permanent disability when he was injured Oct. 1, 1953 at Eight Mile and Greenfield roads.

Chief Federal Judge Arthur F. Lederer had finished selecting the jury when the settlement was announced.

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Justice Elsarelli Sees Traffic Law In Effect by March

SOUTHFIELD—A comprehensive traffic ordinance should go into effect about March 1 if everything goes according to schedule, according to Township Justice Edward A. Elsarelli.

"I will present it (the ordinance) Jan. 24 to the township board," said Elsarelli, who was asked by township board in December to draft the law after it was pointed out that Southfield was losing a lot of revenue from Justice costs now going to the county.

A TWO-WEEK bout with bronchial pneumonia delayed drafting of the ordinance when Elsarelli was stricken Dec. 20.

His March 1 prediction should come about, however, if township trustees meet for ordinance at their Tuesday night meeting. It takes 30 days for the law to take effect. The ordinance would not cover traffic felonies, such as manslaughter, which are handled by State law.

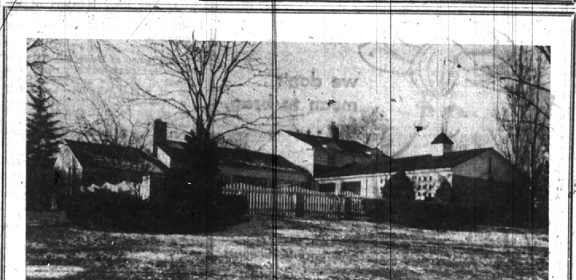
