New Law Affects Social Clubs

In accordance with a new state law, rules governing Birmingham high school social clubs were changed recently.

The new law provides that any organization having members in high school is obligated to have membership open to anyone meeting certain qualifications set up by the organization, under the supervision of the school.

Previously, high school social clubs had the privilege of accepting or rejecting members as they saw fit, with certain provisions. For example, a C average as well as acceptable citizenship was required.
