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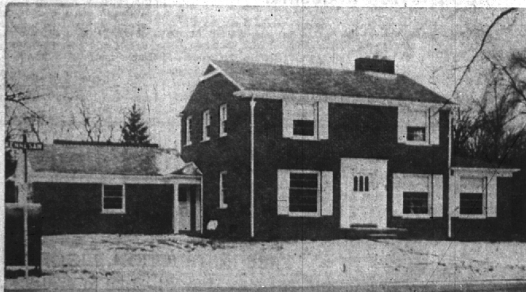
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Exams Discussed At Southfield

Due to the trade winds on this north shore of the island, there are no insects so hotels have no windows or even screens.

Showers come up now and then, at which time, temporary windows are set in, but for the most part, life is all in the open air.

The romantic and relaxed atmosphere of the colorful, tropical island led the Boehms feeling that they had really had a vacation to remember always.

Their hotel was the Silver Reef where they report excellent food, swimming and leisurely entertainment.

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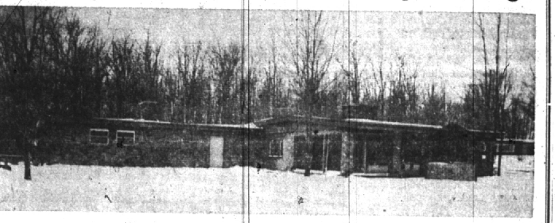
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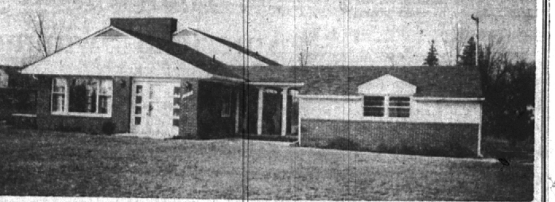
