Safecrackers Rob Lutheran Church

The theft of \$151.37 from a small safe at Our Shepherd Lutheran church, 2225 East 14 Mile, was reported to police last Thursday by the Rev. H. G. Allwardt.

The safe's contents, all insured, included hundreds of times contributed as a special Christmas offering by church school children.

The robbery was discovered by Mrs. Allen A. Bistau, of Royal Oak, who entered the office on stopping at the church to pick up some tables.

There the thieves, who had forced a window to enter the building, pried open the safe door with crowbars, police said.

The wall safe was lying smashed open on the floor. It had been torn from its concrete setting under a stairway and dragged to the church office.
