Oct. 3 commission approval. City planners Oct. 4 denied request for purchase of the northwest corner of 14 Mile and Cranbrook by Birmingham Athletic Club. A. L. Colbert was renamed chairman of the special gifts committee of the National Conference of Christians and Jews for 1956. Bingham Farms charter was approved 99 to 0 in Oct. 4 election. Lathrop councilmen earmarked \$600 to \$900 Oct. 2 to hire an engineering firm to survey a possible route for a sanitary sewer from the city to Detroit's system. The city was warned next day of impending court cases in reference to lack of action against Rouge pollution. Maples took lead in the EML trophy race by downing Mr. Clements, 21-0, in their opener. Southfield drubbed Berkley, 32-0.

Issue of October 13 A community auditorium on part of a proposed acre recreational unit at 14 Mile and Cranbrook was suggested in a recreation survey by Frank Whitney. It urged a full-time program, that future plans and needs be considered vital, and that some facilities be developed immediately.

A "certificate of award" for preserving local and Michigan history was received by Birmingham Eccentric editor George R. Averill at the Michigan Historical Society's Flint convention Oct. 7. More than 1200 volunteers swung into action in 1955's Torch Drive campaign, with goal of \$200,495.

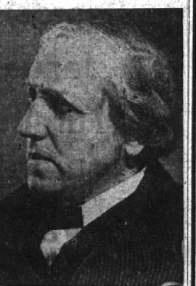
