Iron Pipes, Sump Pumps For S'field?

SOUTHFIELD.—Township board declared intention of amending the building code to include a requirement that iron pipe be used in all sanitary lines beneath basements and for 10 feet out away from every home in Southfield.

The amendment would also require sump pumps installed in specific areas, which were not delineated when the amendment is drawn up by Township Attorney Leonard Lamb and Building Inspector Frank Gidley.

RODNEY M. Lockwood, builder, who was at the township hall for approval of the 90-let Cranbrook Village subdivision Four, told the board he did not believe sump pumps would be a permanent answer because of noise and future maintenance problems, and because a sewer line would better serve Southfield than sump pumps.

"Do you see any sewage system in the immediate future, Mr. Lockwood?" asked Trustee Donald Swanson.

"YES, I think I do," said Lockwood, who has been the chief designer to the privately financed Interceptor, according to Eugene Swann, township supervisor.

Swann said the sump pump should be required wherever drains do not run down hill, or wherever basement flooding has been a problem.
