B'ham Commission Schedules August Zoning Hearings

Four zoning hearings have been scheduled by the Birmingham city commission for August. They are: The Twining property, Aug. 13; Socony Oil and Lambert properties, Aug. 13; Adams Park subdivision lots 56, 57 and 58, Aug. 6, and city-owned parcels at Lincoln and Commerce, Aug. 6. Business Offices professional zoning has been recommended by the planning board for the Twining and Lambert properties, both recently annexed to Birmingham. Lambert property owners, however, object to the plan board's recommendation, asking instead for a Business A zoning. The Lambert property is on 14 Mile. Twining property is on the northeast corner of Adams and Bowers.

THE LAMBERT request will go to the plan board for further consideration. The board had not discussed the case with the Lambert before coming to its decision. Adams Park subdivision lots, on the southeast corner of Hunter and Webster, have been recommended for Business B classification. The city is attempting to sell these lots for business purposes.

Foundation Urges Parents to Secure Salk Vaccine Now

Oakland county parents are urged to protect their children against paralytic polio by making prompt use of the Salk vaccine. "Vaccine now" is the appeal being made by Dr. Robert J. Mason, chairman of the medical advisory committee of the Oakland county chapter, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. "Vaccination now will prevent paralytic cases and even deaths in August and September, months of high polio incidence," stated Dr. Mason who gave reassurance to parents that the Salk vaccine is safe and effective. Children from one through 14 years and pregnant women are eligible for the vaccine, which can be obtained either through physicians or health department clinics.

Open Hunt Worker Is Traffic Victim

An employee of Bloomfield Open Hunt was one of two men killed Sunday night in a four-car collision on US-10 just south of Hatchery road in Drayton Plains. The victim, Robert Slade, 36, of Drayton Plains, had been employed as a bartender for a little over one year. Killed in the same crash was Christ Demos, 60, of Detroit. State police said investigation was not complete, but one of four drivers lost control of his auto and the fatal pile-up occurred.

B'ham B of E Reviews Plans For Two Schools

A delegation of residents from Westchase Village subdivision appeared before the Birmingham Board of Education Tuesday to oppose transfer of their children from the Bloomfield Village school to the Franklin school. In May the school administration decided to transport these children because the expected increase of students would overcrowd the Bloomfield school.

FINAL PLANS were submitted by the architect on the two proposed elementary schools—Valley Woods and Greenfield. Plans show a wide use of glass, new lighting fixtures and building materials. Sale of \$2 million in school construction bonds was awarded to the brokerage firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Beane and associates.

The board received complimentary information in regard to their financial standing. The Moody Investment Co. has advanced the Birmingham school system rating from BAA to A, highest an organization can receive.

Parking Revenue Bonds at Ceiling

Final \$305,000 in Birmingham parking system bonds were sold Monday night to a brokers' syndicate headed by First of Michigan. Average interest rate was 3.97 per cent on bonds which must be paid in 23 years or less. The city also has another \$195,000 in bonds outstanding from the first sale, which will be ready for public hearing before the preliminary investigations are completed.

Maple-Bates Alley Near Hearing Date

Appraisals and cost estimates have been ordered on an alley to serve business properties in the block at the southeast corner of Bates and Maple. Subject of considerable argument for more than a year, city commissioners now feel the matter will be ready for public hearing when the preliminary investigations are completed. The city has considered advisability of putting in a small parking lot in the block's southwest corner at the time any alley is constructed. Commissioners have not gone beyond the "guesstimate", however.
