Area Defense Alert System Needs Patching

SOUTHFIELD — All did not go as well as it could during Friday's civil defense alert test, but there were one or two bright spots, according to Mrs. Lynn Hershey, CD director.

Northland Center drew high praise from Mrs. Hershey for a complete and prompt report of their activities in the alert.

Richard W. Frey, assistant general manager of Northland, said that all emergency measures were in operation within 45 minutes of alert, received at 10:55 a.m.

According to Frey, auxiliary police, fire and other civil defense aides carried out their duties without a hitch.

Southfield township government offices and personnel were "wiped out," said Mrs. Hershey, who said that Supervisor Eugene Swen delayed putting into action the chain phone system to alert other officials.

GOVERNMENTAL figures from Southfield, Lathrup, Franklin and Birmingham Farms were to set up theoretical headquarters in the Franklin Community church.

However, all Southfield government officials were not notified, which shows up one of the weak links in the system, said Mrs. Hershey. Also, the Elgin exchange is "most difficult to do business through at that time of day," added Mrs. Hershey.

Theoretically, Southfield and Lathrup police were to keep traffic moving on the main thoroughfares and out of residential districts to cut down looting and disorder.

The phone chain system was not too satisfactory, she reported. Mrs. Leslie Fraser and Mrs. Walter Byers were in touch of this system in Franklin.

"WHERE WE could get calls through, it went right down to the last house," said Mrs. Fraser. "There were a lot of homes where there wasn't any answer at all."

"People should know that from now on until sirens are installed, when they hear the church bells ringing at other than regular hours, their families should take cover," said Mrs. Fraser.

It took about 20 minutes to alert those (at home) in the Franklin area by the chain phone system, added Mrs. Fraser.

IN LATHRUP, City Administrator Leonard A. Wachowksi was contacted at 10:52. By 10:54 a.m. Councilman Richard N. Cogger was notified and putting into action Mr. Mackey received word at 10:57. Other officials were out of state.

Mrs. Hershey said that many of the weak points were underlined by Friday's test drill and that she would like to see the system patched.

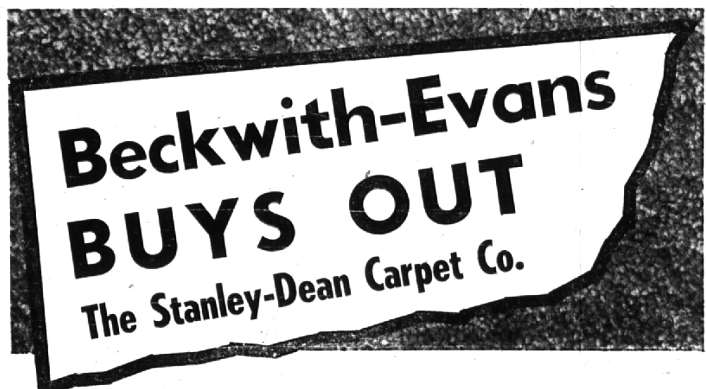

Starting Over On Parking Lot Street Openings

A second start was made this week on providing easier access to a 175-car parking lot north of Hamilton street.

Birmingham commissioners scheduled right-of-way and paving hearings on Fernside and Park street for Aug. 20.

Monday night the commission indicated strongly that the city probably will begin on the assumption that the entire parking lot special assessment district also benefits from the openings. It can be reduced in size if desired.

The city is proceeding on advertising the sale of six residences, acquired together with property through condemnation.

Possession is desired by Sept. 1 so the lot may be developed by late fall, City Manager D. C. Egbert said.
