

## B'ham Woman Named Volunteer-of-the-Month

Mrs. Frank Basford, of Birmingham, has been named Volunteer-of-the-Month by the Central Volunteer Bureau of the Pontiac Area United Fund serving the Pontiac-Birmingham-Waterford area.

Mrs. Basford was one of the first registrants of the Bureau and has been working with the Catholic Family Center for almost two years. One day of each week she spends with the girls from the unwed mothers' home, the Marriell apartments, in Farmington.

SHE plans various outings for these girls—shopping trips, an afternoon at the movies, picnics, and many times just drives around the countryside.

Like most volunteers, Mrs. Basford had been given an orientation course in the work of the agency. According to Leonard Jagers, director of the Catholic Family Center, Mrs. Basford was selected for this particular job because of her sympathetic and understanding attitudes about people. She was "one of those who cared."

WHAT the unwed mother is like and why she becomes an unwed mother is a complex question. Its roots are embedded in those emotions of early childhood which form the basic pattern and structure of the individual's personality. Far more than most, this specific problem represents a direct expression of emotional conflict, Jagers told Mrs. Basford during her initial training courses.

Mrs. Basford has absorbed this volunteer training into her philosophy of service. She says, "All the girls are so very sweet and nice and I feel that I am helping them over a difficult period in their lives. I feel that I am helping rehabilitate them and I do try to find jobs for them later."

205 Lake Park drive, Birmingham. They have three children, Joseph, 23, a senior at Michigan State University; Michael, 21, a senior at the University of Michigan; and Kathleen, 17, a senior in Our Lady of Mercy high school, Detroit.
