Also for the Purpose of Voting up the Following Propositions:

PROPOSITION I
Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the Township of Southfield, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest, and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for the period of five (5) years, from 1956 to 1960, both inclusive, by .08 of 1% (.80 per \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation as equalized by the State, for the purpose of:
a. Purchasing neighborhood Park and Recreation Sites and providing capital improvements and maintenance therefor.

PROPOSITION II
Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the Township of Southfield, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest, and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for the period of five (5) years, from 1956 to 1960, both inclusive, by 1.10 of 1% (.1100 per \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation as equalized by the State for the purpose of:
a. Purchasing a Township Park and Recreation Site and provide capital improvements and maintenance therefor.

PROPOSITION III
Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in the Township of Southfield, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, for all purposes except taxes for the payment of interest, and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1932, be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for the period of five (5) years, from 1956 to 1960, both inclusive, by .02 of 1% (.20 per \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation as equalized by the State, for the purpose of:
a. Acquiring a site for and constructing a Township Hall.

Joint Planning, Zone Bds. Vetoed

SOUTHFIELD — Harry N. Dell, township attorney, has ruled that Southfield cannot combine the zoning board and planning commission into one body as township board had moved to do with an ordinance recently.
Dell recommended that two ordinances be drafted, one for zoning board, one for planning commission.
"We seriously doubt that the zoning board has any real power to approve plans or to approve the subdividing of land, ... even the planning commission has no such power until a master plan has been adopted and filed in the process of doing this now. ... also, due to township authority to designate approval of plats by any other body created within the township," Dell concluded.
