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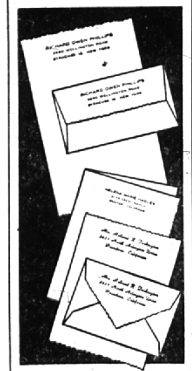
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Make Home in Rochester After Canadian Honeymoon

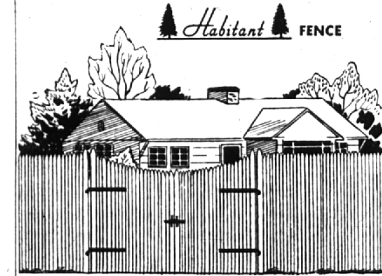
A reception at Rotunda Inn followed the ceremony.

Secret pals of the Franklin cemetery auxiliary will be revealed at the picnic luncheon at 1 p.m., July 12, at Springdale Park.

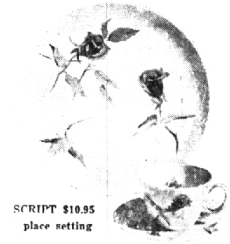
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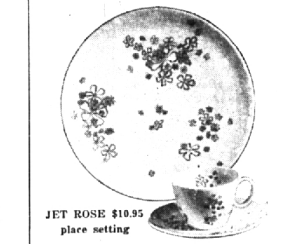
