Those persons who have already registered under the permanent registration system, and have voted within the last four years, do not have to re-register.

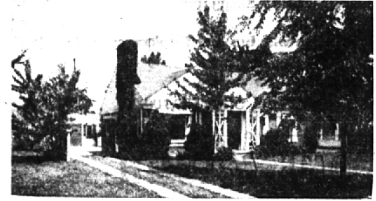

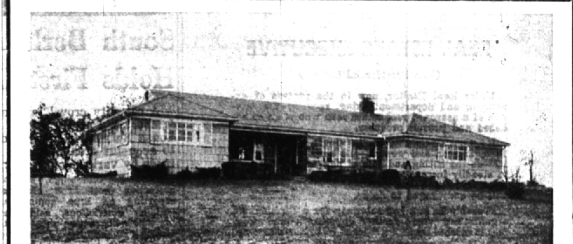

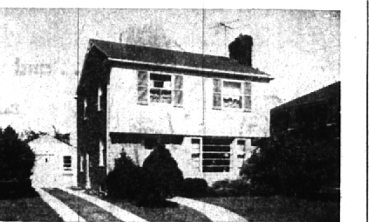
