

World Federalists Hold Assembly

The tenth annual national assembly of the United World Federalists opens on Friday, June 15, in Detroit in the grand ballroom of the Sheraton Cadillac Hotel, with more than 500 delegates in attendance from every corner of the country, according to an announcement made by Elliott S. Nichols, chairman of the Oakland County chapter, who lives on Tiverton road.

After an invocation by the Rt. Rev. Richard S. Emrich, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, delegates will get down to business.

A highlight of Friday's session will be a panel discussion on the peaceful uses of atomic energy led by Dr. Henry J. Gomberg, assistant director of the Phoenix atomic project at the University of Michigan.

Home from a European tour are the Allan R. Summers of West Lincoln avenue, Bloomfield township. They sailed from New York March 17, stopping first in Naples.

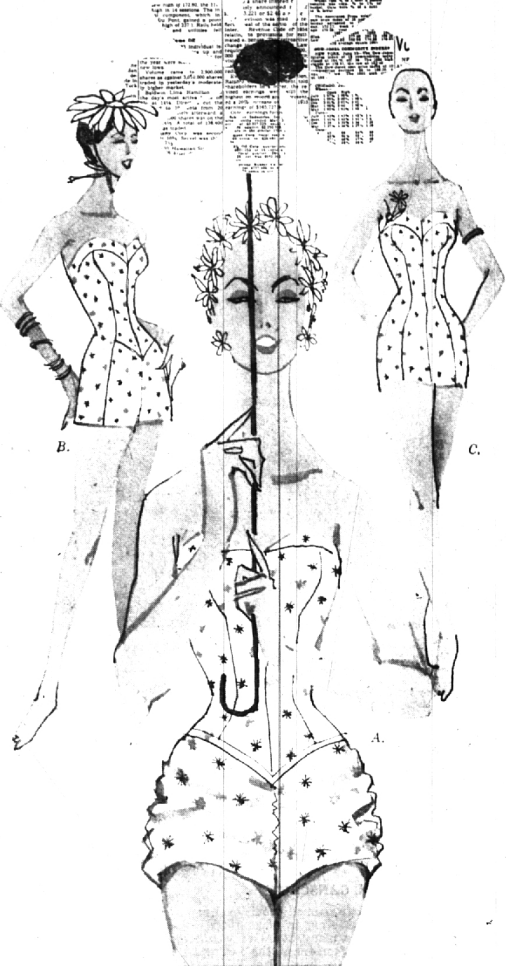
From there they worked their way up through Italy, Southern France, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Amsterdam, Brussels and then to England.
