

**New Property and Facilities OK'd By B'ham B of E**  
 In recent action at two meetings of the Birmingham Board of Education, the members continued the allotment of funds to increase the facilities of the growing school system.  
 In a special meeting last week, four six-duty GMC buses were purchased from the Wilson GMC Co. of Birmingham. The 60-passenger vehicles will cost \$6,611.85 apiece.  
 Acquisition of three lots on Lincoln avenue adjacent to the present bus garage was approved by the board. The price of the property is \$4,500 and is required for the expansion of the bus building.  
 SCHOOL finance was the main consideration taken by the board at the regular meeting Tuesday when approval was given to the retirement and transfer of some bonds.  
 In matters concerning personnel the resignation and appointment of teachers, secretaries and custodians were all approved.  
 William Spence was re-elected as the member from the school board to serve on the Recreation Board.  
 Requisitions for general school supplies (books, paper, art, shop) for all the city's schools was passed with a total cost of \$76,171.03.  
 Buses were required for the construction of the two cottage schools which will accommodate kindergarten classes. Low bids were taken from the Julian Wilson Co. in the amount of \$33,250.

 too cold, and the ice too thick. While the cargo ships waited in open water, the icebreakers traveled back and forth through the ice with the cargo to within 5 miles of Hut Point where the ice coasters with tractors and snow sleds took over.  
 Even though they had worked eight hours on their regular assigned tasks, the crew of the Eastwind often helped with the cargo handling to shorten their stay in the cold Antarctica.  
 FOR RELAXATION the crew of the Eastwind played baseball and football on the ice. Ardent cameramen snapped the ever mountain ranges and ice formations. Jon's pictures include movies of leopard seals, penguins and rolling, blowing killer whales.  
 Although they found the antics of the killer whales interesting, the crew was warned to stay away from the edges of the ice. The whales have a sly way of swimming under the ice and pushing it against, tossing penguins and men into the icy waters.  
 In Antarctica the curious little Adelle penguins grow from 1 to 2 feet tall, but Emperor penguins sometimes reach a height of 5 ft. One little fellow became a social outcast after young humorists painted a red bow tie and buttons on his snow white tuxedo front.  
 DURING THE three months the Eastwind spent near the South Pole, atmospheric disturbances caused a radio blackout which lasted 3 1/2 days.  
 The 150 men who remain in Antarctica during the winter will study these disturbances, while another force in the Arctic will record similar phenomena.  
 Ninety men remaining over winter will stay at Little America No. 5 on the Ross Ice shelf, while the other half will stay at Hut Point. A fresh convoy of supply ships will leave for Antarctica in November this year.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that in conformity with the Michigan election law, the final date for registration in order to vote in the General Primary Election is Monday, July 9, 1956 at 8:00 p.m.

TO VOTE AT THIS ELECTION, all persons must be registered.

Citizens of the United States, 21 years old, who have resided in the State of Michigan six months and in the City of Birmingham thirty days prior to August 7, 1956, are eligible to register.

TO REGISTER: Call in person at the office of the City Clerk in the Municipal Building on or before 8:00 P.M. Monday, July 9, 1956.

TO TRANSFER a registration from one address to another WITHIN THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, send a signed request to the office of the City Clerk stating present address, former address, and date of moving to present address. Such transfer may be made any time up to and including Monday, July 9, 1956 at 8:00 P.M.
