Youngsters Participate in Popular Sport

One of the most talked about events of the season is under way at Bloomfield Open Hunt . . . the 39th annual Detroit Horse Show . . . recognized as a class "A" show by the American Horse Show association. The event opened Wednesday and will continue through Sunday.

The show is put on to maintain a tradition of outstanding equestrian competition in the area, to provide an opportunity for owners and riders of horses to exhibit their mounts and skills before the public and to encourage youngsters to participate in one of the oldest known sports.

Exhibitors and riders are present from throughout the United States and Canada and volunteers from the Bloomfield Open Hunt who act as sponsors and hosts. There are at least 350 entries in the 13 events, representing 94 classes, and \$10,000 in prize money await winners.

Handling the trophy selection and presentation are Mrs. Graham John Graham and Merrill Bates.

Among the numerous trophies in the junior division for riders 18 years old and under the Joan Coulson Memorial trophy for working hunters and the Skip Cozans Perpetual memorial trophy for junior hunters.

There is a trophy for the winning pony under saddle and another for the winner of the ASPCA horsemanship class as well as those for the various hunter classes.

The trophies are in the form of silver bowls, cups and trays, bronze horses and many other designs. They are retained for one year by the winner.

ADDITIONAL features will be a car exhibition, showing new models of American and foreign production and sports cars and a precision drill by the Detroit Police Mounted Division Drill team.

A specialty act will be presented in the main show ring at approximately 8 p.m., today, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.

Also available on the grounds for the children to ride will be Palomino Pony Hitch.
