

How to "Butch" Tulip Petals

Tulips make a great attribute to our gardens in the Spring-time, but seem to die down so that you can freshen up the flower beds with annuals.

Again, this year I could stand to see the old leaves only about two weeks after the petals had fallen. The important task at this date is to feed the bulb in the ground, so we know that immediately after flowering all bulbs from the next year's flower. Therefore, a good fertilizer should be a balanced mixture of fertilizer. We must keep our horticultural thinking up to date and realize that we can place in a garden any plant purchased through-

out the season which is in a container, preferably a tar paper pot.

THEREFORE, YOU can add roots and other plant material through the growing season. Work quickly, have your hole dug the right size and have rich supplementary soil ready to fill in. Water well every day for ten days, and for the first three days have a cover over the plant as protection from the sun. Bushel baskets are good for this purpose, even if they have to be elevated by three sticks to accommodate the height of your plant.

This year plan to fill several eight-inch pots with single mum cuttings. Sink them in the ground to be removed and placed for your pleasure to add color in your garden the middle of August. Only select early flowering varieties and pinch them back at intervals until the last of July to assure bushy plants.

PROBABLY SOME of our local boys wouldn't mind turning Spanish for the summer months, because you don't see much grass here in Spain. While I was in Madrid, our ambassador arranged for a Spanish lady to take me around to private home gardens.
