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The name Westwood Village was chosen, said Shurtliff, to eliminate factionalism but the name could be changed if too many persons objected, he added. Emphasizing that his position as president of the Greenfield-Beverly association and as president of the incorporation committee have no direct connection, Shurtliff said he felt that the majority of his association's board of directors favored incorporation as a village.
