LATHRUP—Councilman Richard N. Cogger was appointed civil defense deputy director by other councilmen last week at a meeting held by Lewis C. Jarrett, Oakland county civil defense director.

Cogger, in accepting the post, and a director of civil defense in Lathrup was needed to gain proper representation and assistance from both local and Federal governments, and to have a voice in spending \$750 allotted by the city earlier this year to Southfield township's defense program.
