**TODAY'S LESSON IS FOR THE FIRST THURSDAY AFTER FATHER'S DAY**

It was observed that in the days preceding Father's Day the sons and the daughters made unusual purchases from the shops and bazaars and, clothed in resplendent garments of khaki, denim and even dungarees did bear these gifts into the homes in honor of the pater familias.

The gifts in those days were apparently designed to cause the father to dig, plant, rest, squirt, fertilize, cook, edge, mow, sweep and so forth.

Let us see what activities today's fathers would engage in, had they received these gifts—

- Plant POTATOES, GLADIOLUS, DAHLIAS, PEACOCK ORCHIDS.
- Fertilize the lawn with AGRINITE (one application) or 10-6-4 (now and again in July).
- Water blue grass and fescue lawns once a week BUT put on 1 INCH of water each time.
- Pinch off all dahlia stalks except the main one. For exhibition blooms, even this stalk will require further disbudding.
- Resulting flowers of hollyhocks will last longer if excess buds and most of the "tip" buds are removed.
- Break off the old heads of rhododendrons and laurel but do not remove any of the branches.
- Fertilize the flowers and vegetables again using STADLER'S GARD-N-GRO, AGRICO for GARDENS or special materials for special plants and shrubs.
- SPRAY.
  - SOFT Brown Scale. During the next 3 weeks each scale will hatch out from 100 to 200 little animals. This is the time to GET 'EM! Spray June 21—July 1—July 10 with MALATHION (2 tablespoons to 1 gallon of water).
  - European Pine Shoot Moths will be emerging in this same period. The same treatment with MALATHION will control them.
  - For caterpillars use DD-DDE or MALATHION.
  - Rose Chafers and Birch Leaf Miners succumb to ISOTOX (contains LINDANE).
  - Keep up the fruit tree spraying with TREE TOX.
  - CAPTAN, FERMATE, SULPHUR and BORDEAUX are about the best fungicides for black-spot, mildew, rust, etc.
  - Rutabaga can be eliminated with AMMATE. SALT, GASOLINE or a SHOVEL.
- CULTIVATE . . . Loosen up the scalp of your garden and around shrubs and trees so air and water can get to the roots. Break the crust around cucumbers, melons, squash, etc.
- Many Flowers and particularly roses keep best if harvested in late afternoon or evening and placed immediately into water.
- Spray or dust beans with ROTENONE when well above ground to control bean beetle. Cover top and under side of leaves. Repeat four times at 10 day intervals. DO NOT USE DDT.
- Use CUTWORM BAIT in evening. CHLORDANE can be dusted on ground at any time.
- For different sized feet we have: 1/2", 9/16", 5/8" and 3/4" plastic or rubber hose.
- For the shower we have: Stationary, rotating, oscillating, adjustable and soaking type watering devices. Also gushers.
- For your scrolicae there are redwood EASY CHAIRS, LOUNGES, BENCHES, etc. and big, comfortable, soft pads.
