tion this summer at Caro State hospital. She is a senior at Western Michigan college in Kalamazoo.

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

In the first place WE will be free from our terribly confused and cluttered situation when we move to our new store at 850 South Woodward in late July. No longer will customers come in, look around and ask, "Do you sell garden rakes here?"

Secondly, we propose to have complete freedom from both errors and complaints on Wednesdays by remaining CLOSED ALL DAY during July and August. If you need salt or something on Wednesday, be sure and order it a bit in advance so we can send it on Tuesday.

Freedom from traffic accidents and other inconveniences is being made possible for the period June 28th through July 4th by the cooperation of your Chamber of Commerce and the Birmingham merchants. They will make shopping so pleasant and exciting you won't want to go away and will simplify the fireworks problem by having a magnificent display the evening of July 4th.

A mosquito-free yard—or at least some freedom from the little biter—can be had by spraying every inch with DD-IDE or MALATHION or BOTH. If your neighbors will do likewise, you can eat your steak before they (the bugs) do.

Freedom from crabgrass can be approached with two materials. Use CRAB-NOT on the plants—use CHLORDANE to knock off the seeds which have not yet germinated.

Disease and (to some extent) bug-free flowers and fruits can be had by REGULAR spraying and/or dusting with things like DD-IDE, ISOTOX, ORTHO ROSE DUST, TREE-TOX, etc.

A weed-free garden is yours if you will now thoroughly weed and cultivate it and then cover the surface with 1½ inches of BUCKWHEAT HULLS or ¼ to 1 inch of PEAT MOSS. We like the hulls better because the air and water go through the roots a little better.

Freedom from cooking in a warm kitchen is a cinch if you do it outdoors on a BIG BOY GRILL.

Freedom from ennui is a cinch if you have at hand a game of BING-IT or even CROQUET.

And on the FOURTH let us all remember the FREEDOM we have and resolve not to tamper with it but to do everything we can to perpetuate it.
