Special Education In 2 Classrooms Set by B of E

Two classrooms for education of mentally handicapped children will be ready when Birmingham schools open for the fall semester, said Paul Carter, assistant superintendent in charge of curriculum.

He said this education phase is being established under a special one-half mill tax provided by county taxpayers. All children enrolled in such rooms, whether from the district where such rooms are or not, are assigned by the county superintendent of schools.

Approval of the opening of special education classrooms will be sought from the state department of public instruction since a portion of the cost may be recovered from the State for approved programs, Carter said.

A TYPE A classroom is planned for Adams elementary school for children in grades through six. Ruth Boltz, fifth grade teacher at Adams, will be the instructor.

A second type A room for primary children has been authorized for Beverly school.

The opening of this room in September is problematical, however, since preliminary screening of children to warrant the setting up of a second type A room at this time, explained Carter, is being given to the feasibility of establishing the Beverly room as a type B room for this general area, he added.

Type A rooms are for children who, although retarded mentally, are found to be educable. Children about whom there is some question as to their suitability are assigned to type B rooms for a maximum period of two years.

FOR CHILDREN with physical defects, centers are being established in and near the heaviest concentrations of population, Carter explained. Additional classrooms will be developed as studies reveal the need for such facilities in all districts. To date, the annual school census has been the primary basis for such studies, Carter said.

Another phase of the special education program due to expansion next year, according to Carter, will be the addition of another visiting teacher. She will coordinate the program in the regular classroom enrolled in but who present problems in social adjustment or emotional disturbance. On the basis of school population, Birmingham is eligible for a third person working in this department, Carter said.

Expansion of the speech therapist staff, consisting of two persons, is not contemplated for next year since the needs of several cases can be met adequately with present staff, Carter said.

New Construction For S'f'd Schools

At a special meeting of the Southfield School board, the members approved over a million and half dollars of new building construction.

Monday's meeting had the new high school swimming pool OK'd for a total of \$429,200. This sum was broken down into \$204,050 for general construction to the Atkin-Fordon Co., \$94,965 for plumbing and heating work to the Davis-Gibb, Inc. and \$35,155 for electrical work to the Kemp Bro., Inc.

The new junior high school, E. J. Lederle, will cost \$1,087,432. This amount is divided in the following order: architectural trades, Alfred A. Smith, \$694,203; mechanical work, Davis-Gibb, Inc., \$296,977 and electrical, Colonial Electrical Co., \$96,252.

Decision on the proposed 12 Mile road school has been postponed until the regular meeting next Monday, said Glenn Schoenhaus, superintendent of schools.

tom, weighted down with binders and water-logged larger pieces of timber, they'd then bring in perch grass, mud and a vast assortment of large and small convenient woods debris.

Adding it all up, the beaver had done as neat a piece of engineering as any MIT graduate could conceive.

Well, after about a month of effort, over weekends, to discourage the beaver from continuing their dam work, I finally called upon the Michigan Department of Conservation office in Baldwin for help.

IF PERSUADED that beaver are causing property damage by building a dam, the department will send a man in to remove them. First, the attempt is to live-trap them, then taking them to some state-owned area where their dam efforts will be more appreciated.

The live-trap is a metal contraption about four feet square, hinged in the middle. When set, they lie flat on the stream's bottom, in the path to be traversed by the beaver as they work at night to repair their disturbed dam.

A trigger is caused to be placed vertically, the idea being that the swimming beaver will strike against it and release a catch, allowing the two sides to come together and thus embrace a beaver.

IN OUR CASE, however, the trap was at first placed too close to the dam's opening, and the smart beaver would only be pushing branches and other debris against the trigger.

When live-traps fail to catch the non-wanted beaver, the department officer will resort to steel traps which, alas, often wound and otherwise harm these largest of our rodent family.

In observing this entire operation we discovered a most singular fact: the stuff we would see cut out of a dam, throwing it upon the stream's adjacent banks, would not be used again by the beaver in repairing their dam.

Kids Replacing Space Craze With Dinosaurs

The space craze has been superseded by a tremendous interest in dinosaurs among many Birmingham youngsters, reports Mrs. Kathleen Burgess, children's librarian at Baldwin public library.

Consequently, Mrs. Burgess says last year's summer reading program with "An Expedition into the Land of the Dinosaur" for the 1956 children's summer program.

Beginning Wednesday, children will literally "dig in" to the subject with paper shovels to encourage them. Though the dinosaur is the program's theme, any subject will have a paper shovel labeled with his name lowered on a scale model depicting the strata of the earth.

CHILDREN WHOSE shovels reach the bottom strata on the pyramid-shaped model after reading 18 books will receive paper dinosaurs.

With the child's name on it, each dinosaur will be displayed at the library until the program's completion August 8, when the young reader will be given his dinosaur.

"We hope the reading on dinosaurs will lead to other subjects as well," says Mrs. Burgess, who with Mrs. Charles Burch will be on hand to help dinosaur club members in their book selections.
