## Farms Resident Will Ask Refund Of Evergreen Tax

BINGHAM FARMS—Southfield township will be asked to rescind all taxes collected by a two-mill levy, voted last year to pay for a series of township truck-line sewers, including the Evergreen Interceptor sewer.

William King, village president, said he would send a letter to Township Supervisor Eugene Swem this week asking that the money be refunded to residents on the grounds that the elections which authorized use of the money have been declared invalid.

"IT SHOULD be necessary for any group to go to court to get back their money," said King. The Bingham Farms president believes the election in the Spring

of 1955 was illegal because improper wording was used, and that the election last February was also invalid because townships have no expressed right, by State law, to call special elections, according to an unofficial opinion attributed to Detroit Bonding Attorney Claude H. Stevens.
