Wednesday night in a showdown fight with other commissioners on the use of a tape recording machine by Mrs. Molnar, commissioners removed from the township hall.

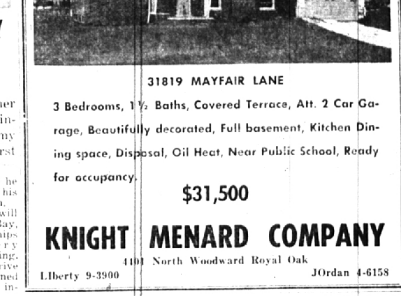
