The girls explained the program and suggested several money-raising projects. Mentioned were bake sales, car washes, and lunch time movies, where students themselves could raise money and create greater interest in the activity.

The amount of money needed to bring one student to America is \$350. After raising this sum, Ferndale must find a family for the student to live with for a year and apply to AFS headquarters in New York. The AFS district representative then interviews the selected family, explaining the complete program.

The students arrive in America during August or September. Next year Michigan will have 35 AFS foreign students.
