B'ham Seniors Rated High in Reading Ability

Nine out of ten Birmingham high school seniors rank above average in reading ability when compared to a national scale, according to Dr. Harry T. Hahn, superintendent of the director of Oakland county schools' remedial reading clinic.

In a brief talk before the Bir-

mingham Rotary club Monday noon, Hahn said he was pleased to see what is being done regarding reading in Oakland county schools.

"The ideas, thoughts and experiences a youngster brings to a reading situation pretty largely determines what he gets from the printed symbols," he said.

He said reading involves seeing (recognizing what the printed term means), comprehension (determining how it is used), reaction (deciding on what it means), then integration (placing it into his own experience).
