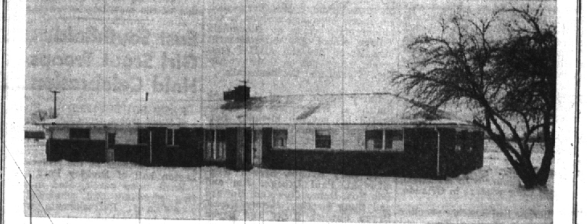
Lathrup Players On Program Of Lathrup PTA
