

To Print Proposed Twp. Zoning Map

SOUTHFIELD-Township's present zoning map will be brought up-to-date as of Feb. 29 and no changes will be entered except through regular procedures set up for obtaining zoning amendments. Township trustees decided last week.

Action was taken in an attempt to bring forth a zoning map which could be used as a reference with regard to a proposed new zoning amendment which residents rejected last year because it was not accompanied by a map.

ZONING map will have both old and new designations so residents can compare the changes before township officials hold public hearings for each township section. About 1000 maps will be printed for public sale before the hearings.

Board members did not want to publish a map with the new designations because it would, in effect, change the zoning without public hearings.

Trustees also declared that all future changes would be dated on future zoning maps. Board members also directed Mrs. Fannie Adams, township clerk, to check the new zoning map against the old map for a comparative analysis of changes.

Commission Okays Parcel Annexation From Troy Township

Annexation of one of the few remaining tracts of Troy township, cut off from the rest of the Troy area by the Grand Trunk Western railroad, was authorized by the Birmingham city commission Monday night.

The commission accepted a petition requesting incorporation of a small triangular area between the foot of Lincoln road and the railroad track, now owned by Steel Door corporation.

A similar petition has been forwarded to Troy township, and final annexation is contingent upon the township board's acceptance when it meets March 14.
