Dr. Rasey has written many books, latest of which is "It Takes Time."

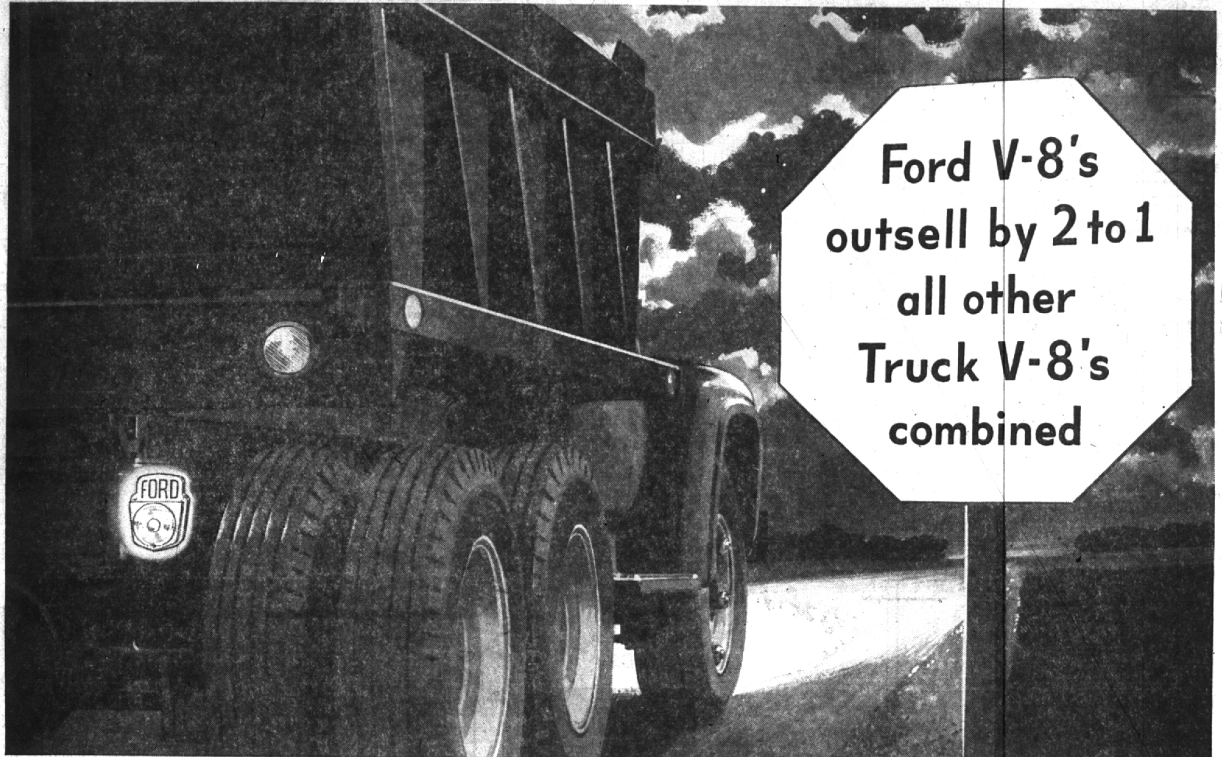

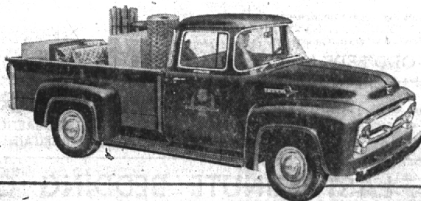
