NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS
 The City Commission of the City of Birmingham will meet Monday, March 19, 1956, at 8:00 P. M. in the Council Chamber in the Municipal Building to consider any objections to the construction of certain improvements in the block bounded by Woodward, Maple, Brown and Forest streets, described herein and to the creation of a special assessment district to defray the cost of acquisition of a right-of-way along the center line of the right-of-way, including the right-of-way extending north from the Assessor's Plat No. 11, said right-of-way being a distance of approximately 225 feet and the improvement to be provided by the construction of a concrete drainage easement, together with necessary drainage structures and other improvements.

The Commission proposes to create a special assessment district to defray the cost of this construction and said special assessment district shall consist of the following described property: "Assessor's Plat No. 11"

"Assessor's Plat No. 11" is a lot containing 2,500 square feet of land, bounded by Woodward Street to the north, Forest Street to the east, Brown Street to the south and the center line of the right-of-way to the west. 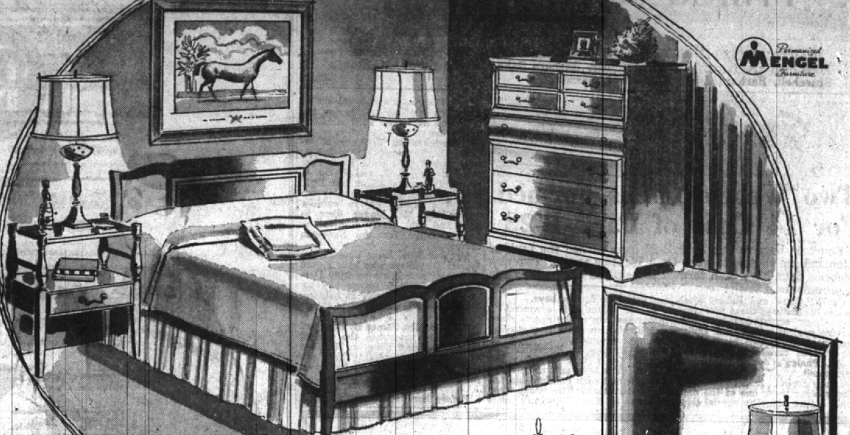

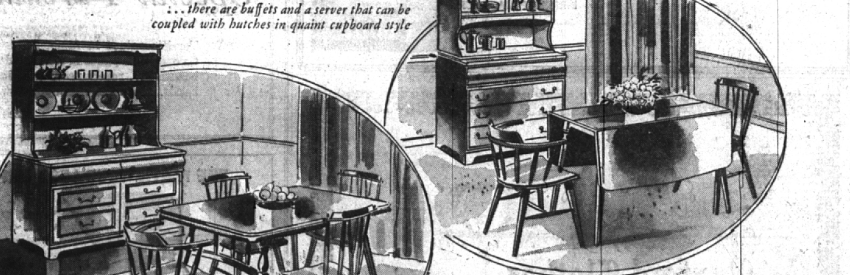
