Good Response To Tree Upkeep Plans

LATHRUP—Post cards, indicating preferences of residents on means of controlling Dutch elm disease in the city, will be turned over to a private contractor, council decided Monday.

Tree Committee chairman Robert W. Gilmour, of 18175 Avilla, said that of 950 questionnaires sent out, 402 were returned, and 382 persons wanted some type of action, public or private, in combating the disease.

Only 7 expressed no interest, said Gilmour, while 286 residents, with 971 trees, would like the city to do spraying.

On the basis of returns, Gilmour recommended that spraying equipment be included in next year's budget. At \$1.50 per tree, income for caring for the 971 trees would bring in about \$1,500, and this figure might be raised as more returns come in, Gilmour added.


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
