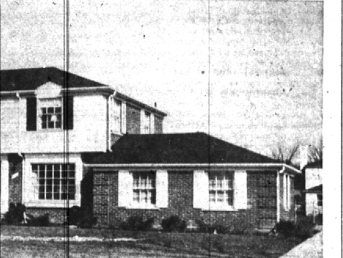
"Wait on Alternate Sewer" Says Main

LATERUP—Ralph A. Main, Oakland county drain commissioner, stated that no steps could be taken toward an alternate to Evergreen Interceptor at this time, in a report to Council Monday.

According to Main, Southfield's inability to contract because of its in-between city-township status, made such an alternate for Lathrup unrealistic because much of the line would have to go through, and be paid by Southfield.

He advises council to wait until Southfield could take action, either by an adoption of a charter or, perhaps more quickly, by a bill in the State legislature which would allow the township to indent its future even though it had not completed the incorporation process.
