Insurance Exec Dies Suddenly At Field Trials

Insurance executive, Edgar H. Jones, 45, was stricken with a heart attack and died Sunday while participating in the field trials of the Michigan Welmarator club in Pontiac.

Mr. Jones was a native of Lansing, where he was a member of the first graduating class in police administration at Michigan State university.

He was with the Michigan State Police force until 1941, when he enlisted in the air force. He served in the Chinese, Burmese and Indian theaters, achieving the rank of lieutenant colonel.

In 1946, Mr. Jones became associated with Equitable Life Assurance society, was appointed assistant agency manager the following year, holding that position until his death.

Active in community affairs, he served as president of the Spartan club until last year. Previously, he had been president of the MSU alumni association. Currently, he held the presidency of the Michigan Welmarator club.

Mr. Jones leaves his wife, Mary Ellen, a daughter, Sharon L., and a son, Robert B.
