## AAUW Hear Professor Of Political Science

James Kerr Pollock, president of the International Political Science association, chairman of the department of Political Science of the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, will speak at the luncheon meeting of Birmingham branch, American Association of University Women, at the Community House Wednesday, April 11, at 12:45 p.m.

Professor Pollock has just returned from Germany and Western Europe. Known in scholarly circles for his many books and articles on elections, political parties and European and American government and politics, he was named by the Saar Plebiscite Commission in 1950 to preside over one of the voting bureaus. He received the Medal for Merit, highest civilian award given by the U.S., for his work as special advisor to the American Military Government and High Commissioner in Germany.

MRS. ARLAIDE Burns Layman, legislative chairman of the group, in charge of this program, points out that of the 13 books which Professor Pollock has written or edited, all but four deal directly with politics, elections and voting procedures in Michigan or Germany. "His advisory connection with U. S. government branches testifies that he speaks with authority on any aspect of present political conditions in Germany or Western Europe," Mrs. Layman said.
