lands of dolls and Mother Goose in the kindergartens. Stopping off in Canada brought visitors to the fifth grade room of teacher Willard Alden. It also brought a good insight into the work Beverly school students put into their international exhibit for parents at Tuesday night's PTA meeting.

WHAT THE international travelers didn't see was the knowledge their children gained in preparing the displays. Before work began instructor Alden divided his class into "research groups", to study history and backgrounds of Canadian features to be exhibited. One research group delved into recreation, then came up with a panorama of posters displaying Canadian sports and pastimes.

ANOTHER GROUP took Canada's products for their study, the result of which was a large map of the nation, surrounded by samples of her raw materials and manufactured items. From each of the products, a line ran to the geographical spot where it is produced.

A research group assigned to Canada's history later portrayed their findings in three-dimensional dioramas framed in shoe boxes. The figure of a Canadian mounted police officer resulted from one group's research into the mounties, their uniforms and history.

A CANADIAN INDIAN research project contributed the huge Totem pole figure. Another research group studying land forms produced a three-dimensional map of Canada, its mountain ranges and hill country clearly revealed with paper-maché.

With vivid memories of the displays they themselves helped to prepare, Beverly school students will remember the lands they studied for a long time.
