

Council of Churches Plans 3-Hour Rites

Protestant churches will cooperate again in holding union Good Friday services in Birmingham.

The above statement expresses the thinking of Wayne county circuit court Judge Wade McCree, who will address the Unitarian Laymen's league at Birmingham Community House at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Judge McCree, a graduate of Fiske university and Harvard law school, will give his views of the negro problem, proposing that negroes and whites follow a course of moderation.
