Three Flags DAR Presents Plaque To Oldest School

"Still sits the school house by the road," as it has for 122 years. The roses are Labser and Eleven mile in Southfield, and the school is Brooks.

No other school in the township is so old. In recognition of its age, the Three Flags chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will present it with a bronze tablet March 12 at eleven a.m.

Originally, the building had one room. It was built in 1834 and named Bedford for the owner of the nearby farm, post office and hotel whose plane was lost at sea in 1928, and his cousin, Dr. Clark D. Brooks of the hospital, Detroit. Both men were former pupils.

For four generations, members of one branch of the Brooks family have attended the school, beginning with John C. Brooks in 1854, and ending a few years ago with his great grandsons, Larry and Tim Smith.
