

Post office Location Revealed

LATHRUP—The temporary post office will be located in the House in the Woods, it was announced unofficially Monday night by Mayor John G. Campbell.

Charles D. Kelley and member of the post office committee which brought a post office to Lathrup, confirmed this Tuesday.

ACCORDING to Campbell, about 1,000 square feet of space will be allotted to Vaid K. Bono, postmaster, for use of the post area and post office. Construction of rest room facilities will be undertaken so that postal employees will not interfere with city business or social activities in the other parts of the house.

Campbell revealed the post office location while reviewing the history of the Co-operative Nursery scheduled to move into the House in the Woods basement, but which was forced to move to the Evergreen House at Evergreen and 11 Mile when a city stop-work order halted basement improvements.

WORK was halted, Campbell said, because Kelley did not have a building permit, and when he did apply for one it was delayed because Kelley failed to say to what use the basement was to be put.

City's zoning board of appeals did grant the permit, but too late for the nursery group, headed by Edward F. Lundberg, 18714 Cambridge.

According to Mrs. Lundberg, the group wanted to get into operation early so they could have some benefits from the nursery before summer school vacations arrived.

ABOUT 47 women, three of them from Northampton and the rest from Lathrup, are now taking their children to the Evergreen house in small groups for orientation purposes, says Mrs. Lundberg, but full operation is not expected until official approval comes from Southfield's zoning board of appeals March 15.

Mrs. Lundberg said she knew of no one who objected to location of the nursery at the Evergreen House, located on township, land zoned residential. Special land use permission must be gained for continued use of the house.

CAMPBELL said he, Chairman Herman F. Lubra, Kelley, Postal Inspector Harold W. Low and other members of the postal committee met Monday morning to discuss postal problems.

Post office trucks, Campbell said, would unload and load mail quickly and leave House in Woods quickly in order to avoid protests from nearby residents.

Selection of a site and completion of the regular post office should be completed within nine months to a year, Campbell predicted.

A postal representative or the postmaster would have to apply to the zoning board of appeals for a permit to use the House in the Woods, Campbell said, adding that this action would take place within the next few days. Kelley added that a permit to use the house would be submitted or that a public hearing would be necessary.

BLOOMFIELD TWP.—Dean H. Robinson, 3540 High Meadow Court, was nominated by the \$10,000 C. Criss Award for his work in promoting traffic safety in Detroit Traffic Judge John F. Watts.

Robinson is the promoter of the Suicide club, an organization devoted to promoting safer actions on the highways. He has produced a safety film which shows consequences of accidents or distribution to schools and large corporations and which has been exhibited before summer school vacations.

"Death on the highway," a safety pamphlet written by Robinson, has been reproduced in almost a million times for distribution.

MUTUAL—Omaha sponsors the Criss Award in memory of its founder. The award carries with it a gold medal as well as the money. Last year's winner was Dr. Jonas Salk, discoverer of the anti-polio vaccine.

In his nomination of Robinson, Judge Watts said, "He has devoted himself to a great deal of time and effort, especially with the teen-age group."

Southfield PTA Discusses District Change

SOUTHFIELD—A discussion of the advantages of third class school district was conducted Tuesday night by the Southfield Area PTA Council. Southfield is presently a fourth class district.

A third class district would increase the size of the board to seven members, replacing the present five member board.

Dr. W. Ray Smith, professor of Education at Wayne University and authority on Michigan school laws, answered questions from the floor after the discussion.

TWO points were brought out in the discussion which will require answers from increased legislators with state aid to school transportation. The Southfield district with the fourth class designation receives \$2,000 from the state for school transportation.

The amount the district would receive if changed to third class must be determined by the Supt. of Public Transportation.

The second point, which is not clear if a change of districts was made is when the two additional members would be elected to the board. The law is not clear on the subject and a ruling will be requested from the state to clear up the point.

'No Right Turns' For Thru Traffic

LATHRUP—"No Right Turn" signs will be placed on 12 Mile road at Guy Place and Bloomfield in an effort to halt through traffic from using the residential streets to bypass the 12 Mile-Southfield traffic signal.

Rudolph Lakota of 18244 Roseland, who asked the road committee to request the sign regulation, said that on Sunday, Feb. 26 he counted 72 cars going past his home within 12 minutes.

The regulation is effective between 3 and 9 p.m. every day including Sundays.

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Load Limit Law Passed by City

LATHRUP—Road limit ordinance 27 was adopted Monday night as emergency legislation by council and is now in effect.

Load limits, heights, widths, and lengths of vehicles as outlined by State law are required except where special limits are placed to meet special road conditions.

Paving Petitions Delayed for Study

LATHRUP—Petitions asking that 14 special assessment districts be set up for road paving, were referred to the city's advisory road committee for further study and recommendations Monday.

Mayor John G. Campbell delayed the two-week delay but Councilman Richard N. Cogger and Kathryn Feyerstein emphasized that all petitions should be correct before being submitted.

Question of some petitions arose when it was learned that some homeowners had petitioned residents on other streets to the program by having an overall 70 per cent of the signers in favor of paving, even though as high as 50 per cent of some property owners on a single street objected. Seventy per cent of a district is needed to authorize paving.

LEONARD A. Watchowski, city administrator, said residents in favor of paving wanted other streets included so that continuous paving to main thoroughfares could be obtained. This led to the objection by some home owners.

Latest petitions submitted are for paving of: Rainbow circle from Rainbow drive southwest to Red River and Rainbow circle from Red River northwest to Rainbow drive; Bloomfield drive from Eldorado northwesterly about 100 feet; Wilshire from Bloomfield to San Barbara and Santa Barbara from Delores to Lacrosse; and Blackstone from Wilshire to Roseland; Roseland from Blackstone to Southfield, and Somerset from Blackstone to Roseland.

Main objections to these last two petitions which include between the two, five street sections in all. One owner, in order to be sure of having her street paved, submitted an alternate petition for Wilshire from Bloomfield to Santa Barbara.
