Franklin Scouts To Celebrate At Birthday Banquet

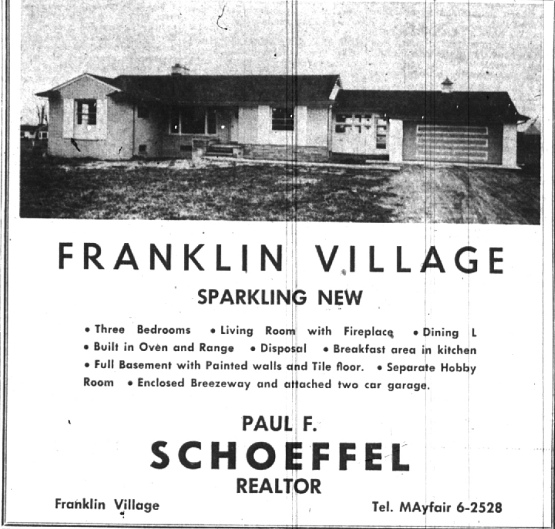
