Approve Revised Shagmoor Plat

BIRMINGHAM FARMS—By a four-to-three vote, a revised Shagmoor Estates subdivision plat was approved by village council last week. President William King cast the deciding vote in favor of the plat. Frank Hoffman, developer, had gone to court to force the village and Southfield township to approve the plat which had been submitted to township board last summer, before Bingham Farms incorporation.

At the time villagers' protests sidetracked the plat. Residents wanted plat approval delayed because they believed the lot sizes too small in comparison with the surrounding homes, and they also wanted to still the plat until the village incorporated so they could grant approval on their own terms.

Hoffman, in his revised plat, cut out several lots as requested by council, thereby enlarging the remaining lots which led to approval of the compromise.

Council Authorizes Street Development

LATHRUP—Representatives of P and R Construction Co. were told Monday night that they did not have to build an entire street in order to build on two lots they own an undeveloped Rackham Blvd. near Rainbow circle.

Earlier they had been denied a permit but were told they would have to complete the entire street or put money in escrow to have the street developed.

Road committee officials, however, approved the company's plan and council gave them the green light, insisting that they develop the street to the far end of their lots and that those property owners who might be affected, be notified.

Rackham, where P and R wants to develop, is 350 feet of unimproved right-of-way and has five lots on each side.
