**Greyhound Bus Officials Study New Ordinance**

Whether company operations within the city would be affected by a proposed Birmingham bus ordinance is being studied by Greyhound Co. officials.

Designed to regulate intra-city operations of a suburban shopping bus service, one ordinance paragraph would prohibit picking up and discharge of passengers wholly within the city.

Some city commissioners expressed concern that this would prevent Greyhound from hauling passengers across town, and eliminate certain school-hour runs.

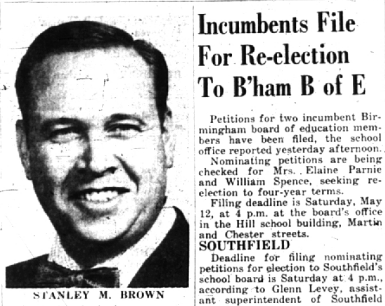

**A&P Division Post To C. L. Taylor**

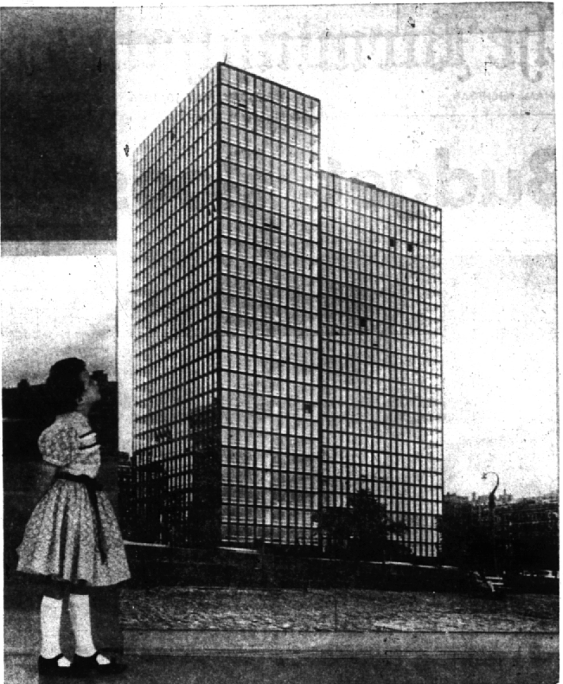
Clyde L. Taylor, 763 Wallace, Birmingham, has been named assistant director of sales of A & P Food Stores' central western division.

local street with some through traffic."

George R. Averill, editor and publisher of The Eccentric, characterized removal of Maple parking as "application of an adhesive bandage to something that needs major surgery—getting 14 and 16 Mile roads opened as primary exits."

"Merchant Sam Bruni and Traffic Engineer T. M. Vanderstempel were at odds on the economic effects of removing parking.

**BRUNI SAID** Pontiac merchants claim their pocketbooks have been slimmed since rush-hour parking has been removed.

Vanderstempel said slow-down traffic congestion forces people to seek alternative routes, thus attracting outlying shopping centers with adequate parking facilities, causing the city shopping areas to deteriorate for lack of sufficient customers.

Mayor James Allen called upon the audience to help the commission in its 10-year fight for 14 and 16 Mile improvement.

"Stop your county supervisors and tell them of our needs," he said.
