SYNTHESIMA SANGUINALIS...

otherwise known as CRABGRASS is preparing to make its annual visit to us with the same welcome we accord to the "uninvited guest" at a quiet supper party for 4.

This pest may appear, depending on weather conditions, toward the end of May. First we wish to generalize a bit on this subject.

The REAL answer to controlling crabgrass lies primarily in proper lawn preparation and in good management practices... well-timed and adequate fertilizing, proper cutting and handling of clippings, appropriate seeding and adequate watering when it is needed.

If crabgrass has taken over there are chemicals with which it can be controlled.

Since we are not concerned at this date with actual crabgrass plants we shall discuss very briefly a PRE-EMERGENCE control which has given remarkably good results. It is called (CHLORDANE and while essentially an insecticide it has the peculiar ability when PROPERLY APPLIED to the surface of the soil to cause crabgrass seeds to end their brief lives as they try to germinate up through the chlordane.

It may be applied as a powder or in liquid form. The liquid form is easier to apply and permits a better coverage of the soil surface.

The rate of application is:—

ONE PINT TO 2,000 SQ. FT.

(Note:—this does not mean 1 pint to 1,000 sq. ft. this does not mean 1 pint to 1000 sq. ft. this does not mean it should be left on the grass blades. this does not mean that NO crabgrass plants will survive!)

It is IMPORTANT that this material MUST NOT be used until AT LEAST FOUR WEEKS AFTER YOU HAVE SOWN LAWN SEED.

Although you may not be able to use this material BEFORE some of the C. G. seeds germinate because of late sowing of lawn seed keep in mind that crabgrass seeds will germinate through June and July. Therefore the chlordane can be applied later in the season and still effect a good control on the late germinating seeds.

Try it on an area and in August count the crabgrass plants in a two-foot square area that was treated and in one in an untreated area and PLEASE report your count to us.

Correction:—Last week we said there are five million seeds in a pound of Kentucky Blue Grass. Should have been 2 1/2 million. Thank you.

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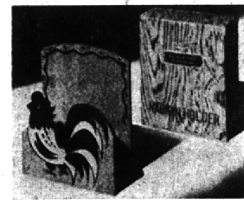
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
