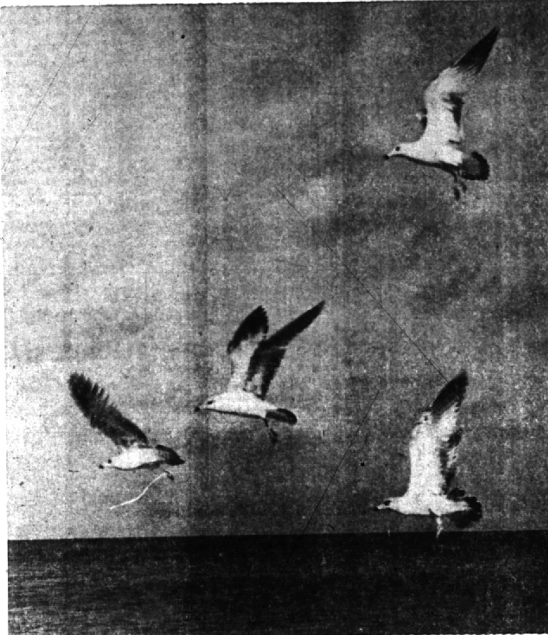

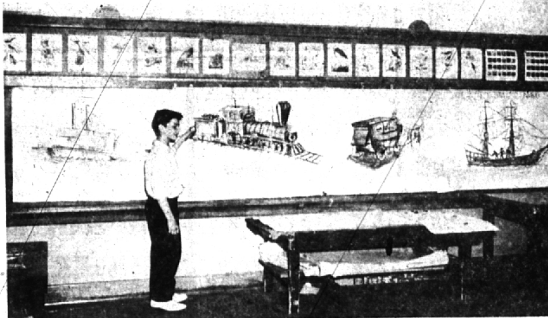
## Photograph on Exhibition
