## Temporary Water Extensions Halted

**LATHRUP**—No more temporary water taps will be permitted in Lathrup, according to a motion made by Councilman Richard N. Cogger, and supported by council. Action followed a request by P and R Construction Co. builders of a home on Rainbow Circle for the tap to a main at Sunnybrook.

"Why shouldn't we require them to put in a four-inch main?" Cogger asked City Administrator Leonard A. Watchowski.

"Personally, I'm afraid we're going to get into the same situation as we are with sewers if we allow temporary lines," said Mayor John G. Campbell.

Councilman Lantz L. Mackey pointed to the possibility of low water pressure or poor fire protection because of such small lines.

## Southfield High Hosts Educational Committee

**SOUTHFIELD**—The annual meeting of the secondary school improvement committee of the Detroit Metropolitan Bureau was held at Southfield high school May 8.

The 14 teams of the committee visited 24 schools during the year, and presented a preliminary report on promising practices and critical problems in secondary school practices.

Registering at the high school at 3:45 p.m., 130 guests attended the general session and 10 group sessions.

Speaker at the banquet, held in the school cafeteria at 6 p.m., was Dr. Harold Hard, professor of education at the University of Illinois, who spoke on promising practices in secondary school education.

Southfield high school is a member of the bureau, and principal Martinus Van Ameyde a member of the committee, serving a three-year term.

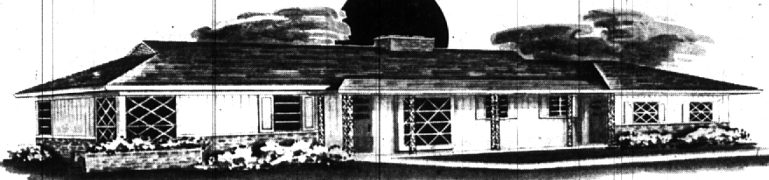

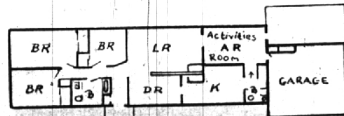

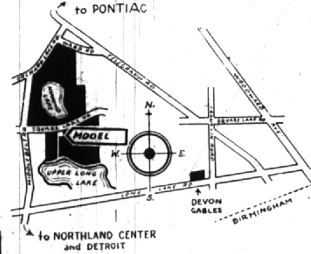
